

# Future hope in a forgotten conflict

The military coup in 2021 plunged Myanmar into a deep humanitarian crisis.

Children as young as ten are recruited by armed groups to carry weapons or supplies. Many are forced to serve as porters, informants or even soldiers.

Terrified parents go to great lengths to ensure their children stay safe. Mo Heng (pictured below) risked her life to protect her child from forced conscription. She fled to the border where each day is a struggle for survival.

### Because of your vital support:



We provide

safe spaces for children who have fled conflict, conscription or abuse.



We equip

16

female teachers to support children suffering from displacement and trauma.



We deliver education to

398

students who cannot access formal schooling.



We supply nutritious meals to children living in abject poverty or coercive conditions.

HART's local partners create safe learning environments for displaced children who are denied access to formal schooling.



Pregnant mothers seek refuge in remote jungles. They give birth in highly dangerous locations, with no access to antenatal support or safe delivery services.

The mothers' search for food is a daily struggle, which adds to the risk of miscarriage and stillbirths. Their babies may be born prematurely or suffer from infections. Yet few international organisations are able to provide assistance. There is almost no special care to help them survive.



We have trained and equipped

Community Health Workers in places without mainstream services.



We provide

500

life-saving interventions each year for mothers and their babies during pregnancy and labour. "We are often the only healthcare providers in our catchment areas. Our communities rely on us to save lives and treat the sick. There is so rarely any other help."

## Emergency relief in Sudan

other locations

Sudan faces the largest humanitarian crisis ever recorded. Following our Crisis Warning in April, HART coordinated a rapid response in Jabarona Displacement Camp where an estimated 48,000 people seek refuge. We strengthened access to vital maternal and neonatal healthcare, and provided emergency relief for families living in makeshift shelters.



Karima (pictured below) is a mother of nine who escaped a deadly attack on Dem Mansur village. Karima's husband and son were killed in the attack. She and her remaining children fled to southern Blue Nile.

"My village was a beautiful place.
